### Perfectionism and the Gifted Child

A tiny bit of perfectionism can be a good thing. Most of us encourage our gifted kids to work hard to reach their potential. It becomes an expectation that they will do well in school. In their early years of school, they typically do well without having to work very hard because schoolwork is easy for them. They may set unrealistic expectations for themselves and later, when they can't meet those expectations, problems arise. In a school setting, perfectionism is sometimes the cause of underachievement. The student may think that if they can't turn in a perfect assignment, why bother? In severe cases, perfectionism may lead to serious health issues. There are ways you can help your child.
